The Seder

Thursday, April 9th 6:30 p.m.

The Jewish **Passover Seder** is a feast held to celebrate the Exodus of the Jewish slaves from the land of Pharaoh. It is an occasion for praise and thanksgiving with the reading the Haggadah in a family-based ritual stemming from the Biblical verse:

"and you shall tell it to your son on that day, saying, 'because of what this God did for me when He took me out of Egypt'" (Exodus 13:8)

The words and rituals of the Seder are a primary vehicle for the transmission of the Jewish faith from parent to child, and from one generation to the next.

We will hold our own CHS Seder on Maundy Thursday with the telling of the Passover story

Church FAQs: Easter Vigil

Since Ash Wednesday, we have entered into the darkness of Lent, and will soon experience the darkest day of Christianity, the Crucifixion of the Son of God. On Holy Saturday eve, we will celebrate the first service of Easter, the Great Easter Vigil. Historically, this service is the oldest in the church, and in the manner of the Christmas Eve service, was held after the setting of the sun, in darkness and in secret for fear of persecution. While we will start our worship while it is still daylight, the intention is still the same: **to celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord.**

The **Easter Vigil** service transports us spiritually and dramatically from the dark of Good Friday to the Light of Christ on Easter, the new fire which will light our way as we re-tell the Old Testament stories from the time of Noah and Moses and then to hear the Word of God in the Gospel. We will celebrate the Risen Lord by receiving His body and blood and joyfully sing "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today" to praise God for His gift to us. In the ancient church, this was a time for Baptism, for welcoming new members into that special society, the followers of Jesus.

If you have never attended this very important service of the church year, make it a point to be there this year. If you attend the Seder on Maundy Thursday or the service day and meditations of Good Friday, the Easter Vigil is a must for lifting the soul out of the doldrums and darkness of Lent. And lest we forget, bring bells with you. *You'll find out why on Saturday, April 11 at 7:30 p.m.*

From the Rector's Desk



The command to observe Sabbath, tells us, "Thou shalt not work." It does not say, "Thou shalt not play." Dorothy Sayers-wonderful author of fiction but even more luminous in her theological reflections-observes that for two thousand years the Church has struggled mightily to remove the unfortunate accusations about her Lord, the chief complaints about him being a sabbath-breaker, and a gluttonous man-friend of sinner and publican. The Church would hustle out the Magdalans, form abstinence societies in the name of the one who made water wine, and add bans and anathemas to all things from dancing and card-playing to theater-going. Such efforts have placed a stranglehold on words like virtue and morality. As C.S. Lewis writes in his brilliant *Mere Christianity*,

"The sins of the flesh are bad, but they are the least bad. All the worst pleasures are purely spiritual: the pleasure of putting other people in the wrong, of bossing and spoiling sport, and back-biting, the pleasures of power, of hatred. That is why a cold, self-righteous prig who goes regularly to church may be far nearer to hell than a prostitute. But, of course, it is better to be neither."

Classic sly Lewis-that last part. The sadness of the Good Friday retelling finds its proper grounds in the Easter garden of delight. We Christians are built to rejoice. The Sabbath was made for joy not a punitive halt to fun. Sundays therefore, must, follow in suit otherwise they are counterfeit attempts for piety. The days ahead are about celebration. Little girls that skip know a secret. Skipping is not a sign of a glib superficial mind, but of a heart that glows with the love of the world around them and a love inside that makes the feet dance for pleasure. Skipping isn't the fastest way to go from A to B, and you'll never see it as a competition in the Olympics. But there is something deeply sacred about it. Consider the empty tomb. When the scared women ran from the tomb, as they lost their fear, did their feet turn to a skip?

The women had made the Bishop a beautiful hand-made card with praying hands on the front, which they each signed with a little note. One woman made him tissue flowers and another crocheted a scarf made of three different shades of tan and brown. We called it Cappuccino! I had all of the women touch the Bishop's shoulder while he was wearing the new scarf and one of the women prayed a mighty prayer to God on his behalf. Bishop George E. Councill was really thunderstruck by their generosity.

At the end of the two hour visit, the Bishop blessed the completed shawls and the raffle blanket. He proceeded to say that he would like to start off our raffle by purchasing \$100 worth of tickets. We were all awed by his expression of generosity.

and eating of several traditional foods:

- Matzo—the unleavened bread the Hebrews took with them on their flight from Egypt
- Maror (bitter herbs) which symbolize the bitterness of slavery
- Charoset which represents the mortar that the Jewish slaves used to cement bricks
- Salt water to recall the tears shed by the Jews during their time of slavery

This very special celebration of the Word will take place in the Parish Hall. We will then proceed to the Sanctuary to celebrate the Holy Eucharist as Jesus Christ has instructed us to do along with the Stripping of the Altar. The silent vigil in the Garden, arranged in the Church this year, continues from 9:00 p.m. to Midnight. To fully experience Maundy Thursday in this manner is to develop a greater understanding of the last hours of our Lord Jesus before the betrayal and Crucifixion.

Sign-up sheets for the Seder and the Garden of Gethsemane Watch will be in the Narthex. Please consider a donation for the cost of the meal: \$10/adult and \$5/children or \$25/family.

WORDS FROM OUR SENIOR WARDEN

Our Diocesan Convention took place in February in Wildwood, New Jersey. My car buddies included Deacon Johnine Byrer, Pat Egan and Arden Olson, with Father Philip following close behind. I love spending quality time with my CHS family. I always learn something new and special about the people that I am around.

The convention theme this year was, "Revive Us Again." After celebrating the Eucharist with all the parishes, Bishop George Councill gave an inspiring address. I cannot explain what I felt upon hearing his sermon, but I can only urge you to read it for yourself. *You can find his address at the diocesan website: newjersey.anglican.org.*

Bishop Councill expressed how blessed he was to have been given a three month sabbatical. During this time, he climbed part of Mt. Kilimanjaro, toured some national parks in the region of Tanzania and hiked the Camino in Spain. One part of his address that I would like to share came from the words of a young African pastor:

"I won't give up, shut up, let up, until I have stayed up, stored up, prayed up, paid up, preached-up for the cause of Christ. I am a disciple of Jesus. I must go 'til He comes, give 'til I drop, preach 'til all know, and work 'til He stops me. And when He comes, He will have no problem recognizing me."

That is how Bishop Councill intends to serve, 'til He tells him to stop. How about you?

Another highlight from the convention was when our Deacon Johnine was recognized for her Prison Ministry. She gave a short and sweet report on a committee of seven individuals made up of both lay (including our parishioner Hal Murray) and clergy. This group meets in Bordentown and is beginning to organize a Ministry to serve the incarcerated within the Diocese of New Jersey. There are fourteen prisons in the state and thirteen of them are housed in our Diocese. As Deacon Johnine reported, there is clearly a need to visit those in prison and committed volunteers are great. I was thrilled that many people approached her throughout the convention to express interest in this ministry. If you feel the same, please see Johnine or Hal Murray for more information.

As a follow-up, I created a binder of reports from the convention plus the results of the voting for offices. The binder is available in the Narthex. In addition, please consider attending the Confirmation scheduled for June 14th when Bishop George Councill will be confirming our youth.

A Verger's Role in the Episcopal Church

A verger is a committed lay minister within the Church who assists the clergy in the conduct of public worship, especially in the marshalling of processions and in the preparations and execution of the liturgy.

The office of verger has its roots in the earliest days of the Church's history. It shares certain similarities with the former minor holy orders of porter and acolyte and has been maintained in the Anglican Church as far back as the 16th century.

The term “verger” refers to the “virge” or staff that the verger carries in procession. The name comes from the Latin *virga* which simply means a rod or staff; hence, a verger is one who carries a staff. The verger is dressed in special vesture to represent their ministry at the Altar of God in the Church of the Holy Spirit. **Beginning on Passion (Palm) Sunday**, we will begin utilizing the service of a verger at the 10:15 a.m. Eucharist. Our verger will truly represent the motto of the Vergers Guild of the Episcopal Church, *Servitas in culu et cultus per servitatem – Service in worship and worship through service.*
